	 Five fantastic facts: Hilma af Klint's work used shades and tints of colours - lighter and darker tones. Texture means how something feels when it is touched. A collage is a piece of art made from different pieces of paper, photos and other materials. The French word papier collé is where the word collage came from. Romare Bearden created collages about everyday life from memories or books. 	2. A 3D object is a solid object that has three dimensions: length, width and depth.	 Five fantastic facts: Max Ernst (1891 – 1976) was known for using 'frottage'. Tone is the lightness and darkness of colour. Georgia O'Keeffe (1887 – 1986) was known for drawing close up work of flowers. Shading is used to create smooth, even tones. Frottage is creating using rubbings to create texture.

Drawing: Make my voice heard This unit focuses on developing pupils' skills in using different art styles, exploring effects with tools, understanding and applying chiaroscuro, and creating symbolic and expressive drawings. It encourages children to form their own opinions about art, understand the impact of techniques, and convey messages through their artwork. 	 Five fantastic facts: Continuous line art refers to the process where an artist creates a drawing using one line. The purpose of a self-portrait is to show a reflection of the creator. Portraits can show part figures, usually showing the sitter's head and shoulders, but they can also depict the whole figure. A mixed media artwork employs more than one medium or material. One of the most famous and most prolific of self-portraitists was Vincent van Gogh, who drew and painted himself more than 43 times. 	 Five fantastic facts: Observational drawing is where you draw something right in front of you. Monoprint is a form of printmaking where the image can only be made once. Architects are in charge of designing and planning a building, as well as the visual appearance of buildings. Hundertwasser is famous for his unique paintings, art, and architecture that reflect his beliefs of a compatible interaction between human beings and nature. A monument is a type of structure that is created to commemorate a person or event. 	Five fantastic facts: 1. Diego Rivera was a Mexican artist inspired by the Mayan civilisation. 2. Leonardo Di Vinci was famous for his use of chiaroscuro. 3. Graffiti is considered illegal art. 4. A mural is a piece of art on a wall or structure. 5. Street art is like Impressionism, Cubism or Pop Art an art movement.
