SMSC & Change

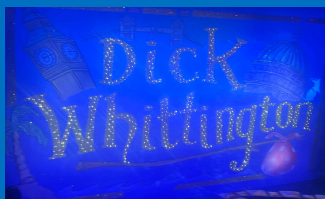

Christmas Enterprise Day



What a truly wonderful, morning the children had this week, making various different Christmas crafts.

WHAT WE'VE BEEN DOING

Class 1

Class One have been exploring different celebrations across the world. They have been looking at Bonfire Night – creating their very own chalk firework pictures, as well as learning about Diwali. The children loved learning about the story of Rama and Sita, and have been re-telling this in their small-world area. They have created their own Rangoli patterns and Mehndi patterns using a variety of materials. The children have been having their own celebrations in the role-play area, writing their own party shopping lists, and baking lots of yummy imaginary cakes. In Geography the Year children have also been learning about human and physical features in our local area, ready to compare with the city of Shanghai.



Class 2

In Class 2, we have started work on shape in Year 2 and multiplication and division in Year 3. We have just written a diary entry in our English and are now beginning to plan a letter. We have been learning about forces such as friction, by carrying out investigations in our Science lessons and

continuing our work on volcanoes in Geography! We are celebrating difference in PSHE and learning greetings in our French lessons, which the children are thoroughly enjoying! During this month, we have also shown our respects for remembrance day and raised money for children in need with our spotty clothes!



Class 3

Class 3 have been working on a new book called 'Mysterious Traveller'. We have been focusing on writing expanded noun phrases, fronted adverbials and relative clauses to help write a prediction about our story. To help us with our prediction, we drew a scene to show how our prediction would look and joined them together to make a long mountainous view.



In Art, Class 3 have been finding out about the great Russian artist, Wassily Kandinsky. Kandinsky focussed on colour and is considered to be the first abstract artist, linking colour with emotion. As a class, we studied his painting, 'Squares with Concentric Circles.' Everyone painted their own concentric circle on a square using their knowledge of the colour wheel. We learned about primary, secondary and tertiary colours.

Safeguarding

Road Safety

With darker mornings and evenings upon us, our focus this month is ensuring we continue the great work we have been doing with the children in school on Road Safety.

Children need help to learn how to cross the road safely. And there's a lot you can do as a parent or carer to support them. It can be hard knowing how best to teach your child to stay safe around roads, so we have compiled a list of useful tips as well as links to some amazing websites and resources.



Be Bright and Be Seen

Brightly coloured or fluorescent clothing shows up well in daylight and dusk when you're heading to and from school, but remember it doesn't work well after dark!

Reflective gear is essential when you're out and about when it's dark to make sure you can be seen in car headlights. Reflective vests, sashes or wristbands work really well.

Accessories like clip on reflectors, armbands and stickers on clothing or bags are a great way to improve your visibility.

Careful choices of routes and crossing points that are well lit are also essential to staying safe when you're out at night.

Bicycle Lights - It's important to have a good set of lights that work and to check them regularly. It's also illegal not to have lights on your bike when cycling in the dark. White lights for the front of the bike and red for the rear. We recommend at least 800 lumens. Ask your child to keep spare batteries in their back pack too, just in case.

Reflectors - Most bikes come with reflectors fitted to the front and back of the bike, and on both wheels, however these aren't sufficient on their own. Check that they are big enough, aren't obscured by clothing when riding, and are not cracked or covered with mud so they can reflect headlights effectively. As with lights, reflectors should be red at the rear and white at the front so people know which direction you are travelling in. Wheel reflectors should be white.

Bright Clothing - Hi vis jackets or vests are ideal, but your child might be against wearing them as they're not the most fashionable. Therefore a hi vis reflective back pack for their school bag might be an option. If you buy a cycling jacket it is likely to already have reflective areas on it. Hi vis gloves are also another way to add some extra safety.

Helmet - It's important for your child to always wear a helmet when cycling. Reflective strips can be added to the helmet if it doesn't have them already. Help your child get excited about their own safety by suggesting that they decorate their helmet and bike with reflective stickers.

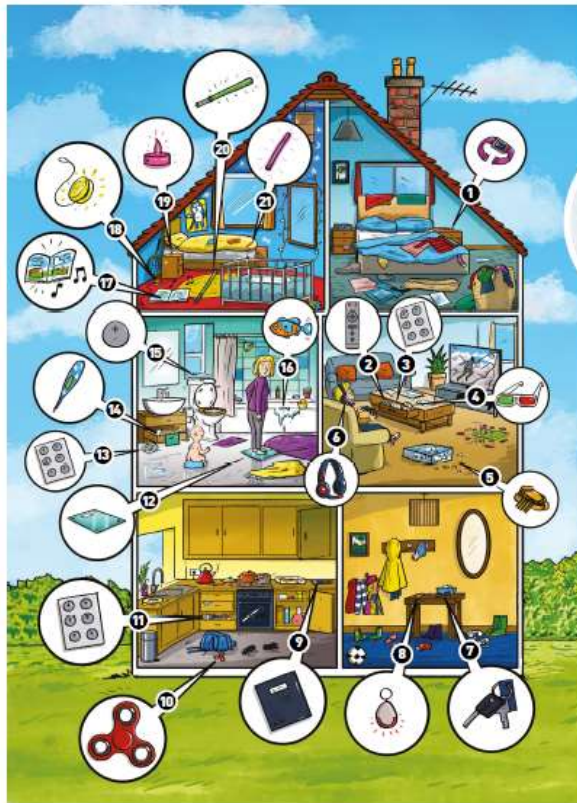

Button Batteries



Button batteries - where are yours?

Button batteries, particularly big, powerful lithium coin cell batteries, can badly hurt or kill a small child within two hours, if they get stuck in the food pipe. Know where yours are, so you can keep your children safe.

Five top tips

- Hunt around your home for button batteries – in products as well as spare and 'flat' batteries.
- Keep products well out of children's reach if the battery compartment isn't secured.
- Store spare button batteries in sealed containers in a high cupboard.
- Remember that 'flat' or 'dead' batteries still hold enough power to badly hurt a child. So put them out of children's reach straight away and recycle them safely and as quickly as possible.
- If you think your child has swallowed one, don't delay. Trust your instincts and take them to A&E straight away or call 999 for an ambulance. Don't let them eat or drink and don't make them sick.

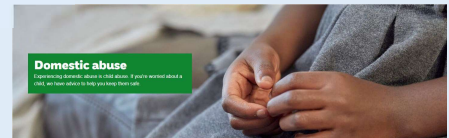
